Valor & Exemplary Service Awards

MEDAL OF VALOR



The Medal of Valor may be presented to fire series personnel in the Fire Department who exhibited courage and risked their life to save another, or attempted to save the life of another, under conditions that put them at extreme personal risk. Fire series personnel must have exhibited their best professional judgment without jeopardizing the mission of the incident.

CERTIFICATE OF VALOR

The Certificate of Valor may be presented to Fire Department and outside agency personnel, as well as civilians who exhibited courage and risked their life to save another, or attempted to save the life of another, under conditions that put them at extreme personal risk.

UNIT CITATION

The Unit Citation may be presented to any unit or group of individuals within the Fire Department whose combined effort was critical in saving a life or attempting to save a life.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The Emergency Medical Services Award may be presented to Fire Department personnel who have distinguished themselves by providing exceptional patient care.

EXEMPLARY SERVICE


The Exemplary Service Awards may be presented to Fire Department personnel who, through their actions and work, have demonstrated a commendable example of one of the Fire Department's six core values: *integrity, teamwork, courage, commitment, community, and caring.* Only one Exemplary Service Award per core value may be presented to an individual or group.

The Fire Chief's Helmet Award recognizes the outstanding achievement of an individual or organization that exemplifies excellence in journalistic integrity and accuracy in the coverage of the Fire Department.

Marc joined ABC7 in 1989 and first specialized in live reporting for the 4:00 p.m., 5:00 p.m., 6:00 p.m., and 11:00 p.m. newscasts. He also served for a time as the weekend anchor.

Marc has won six Emmys, a Golden Mike, an Associated Press award, and a Radio and Television News Directors Association award for excellence in TV News reporting.

PETE DEMETRIOU, KNX REPORTER



Pete Demetriou is a familiar name and voice Los Angeles residents have come to rely on for breaking news for more than four decades. As a field reporter, Pete has covered the 1984 Olympics, 1992 Riots, the 2000 DNC Protests, Occupy LA, the post 2016 election unrest, George Floyd protests, earthquakes and wildfires large and small, and more.

As a Los Angeles native and media fixture, Pete graduated from the University of California Los Angeles, before starting his career in 1978 at KLAC Radio. Field reporting on the streets his entire career, Pete also worked for the ABC and AP Radio Networks, before joining KFWB News 980 in 1985 and has been with KNX News 97.1 FM, 1070 AM since 2008. Pete also worked as a Combat Correspondent during the first Gulf War in 1991, which took him from Los Angeles to Washington DC, to Riyadh and Sharaan in Saudi Arabia.

Known for viewing his work as, "We're writing the first rough draft of history...every day," Pete is the recipient of 26 Radio and Television News Association Awards, including the Lifetime Achievement Award (received this past March),

along with Journalist of the Year Honors from the Associated Press and the Southern California Association of Professional Journalists.

With his trademark commanding voice at the microphone, and years of experience covering first responders and major incidents, Pete is a dear friend and consummate professional in the coverage of the Fire Department.

Community Services Liaisons (CSL) Maria Grycan, Rosemary Vivero, and Eugenia Chan went above and beyond throughout 2024 in providing vital public education/community risk reduction training to residents and communities throughout Los Angeles County.

CSL Grycan is an essential member and lead for the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) cadre. In addition to serving as the primary instructor and developing the curriculum for the two-day CERT Train-the-Trainer class held in November of 2024, CSL Grycan served as the lead instructor for ten CERT classes held in Divisions 3, 4, 5, and 8. CSL Grycan also played a pivotal role in training residents and communities on the importance of the "Know Your Zone" campaign utilizing the Genasys Protect platform.

In addition to CSL Grycan, CSLs Vivero and Chan are pivotal partners in delivering CERT classes across Los Angeles County in both English and Spanish. During 2024, CSLs Vivero and Chan also created emergency preparedness training curriculum, delivering the training to 400 plus seniors throughout the year. In addition to expanding public education and community risk reduction efforts across the Department, CSLs Vivero and Chan are key partners in the Department's Explorer Programs.

TEAMWORK

Harold Shin, Fire Dispatcher II

On December 5, 2024, just after 5:00 p.m., the 9-1-1 Communications Center was notified of a reported traffic collision on Highway 39, just north of the Morris Reservoir Dam. Initial dispatch was to an advanced life support traffic collision but later changed upon arrival of firefighters to a traffic collision with persons trapped.

Engine 97 firefighters arrived on scene and found two vehicles with heavy damage with one patient in full arrest. Initial reports to Fire Dispatcher II (FDII) Harold Shin relayed eight total patients including two immediate, five minor, and one deceased. Engine 97 initially requested one air squad, and quickly added a second air squad and a battalion chief. FDII Shin worked diligently with on scene units to establish a landing zone, medical group, along with a medical helispot.

As on scene firefighters triaged and treated patients, a third air squad was requested, with an updated patient status including six immediate, one minor, and one deceased.



The seven patients were loaded onto the air squads and CARE ambulances, and transported to local area hospitals for further evaluation and treatment.

Managing and tracking a single air resource can be demanding but assisting in coordinating and relaying information to three while also tracking ground units is simply a monumental task. Throughout the incident, FDII Shin remained calm and collected, skillfully streamlining coordination with Fire Department resources, along with the California Highway Patrol, three CARE ground ambulances, and the Los Angeles County Department, of Medical Examiner.

For demonstrating exemplary skill, commitment, and teamwork in coordinating resource support to ensure life safety and prompt service, the Fire Department is pleased to present an Exemplary Service Award for Teamwork to Fire Dispatcher II Harold Shin.

ADVANCED PROVIDER RESPONSE UNIT SAVE

One of the Fire Department's highest utilizers of the 9-1-1 system for emergency medical services resided in the City of South El Monte. This 43 year-old patient had a history of severe alcoholism and substance abuse disorder, depression with suicidal ideation, and was experiencing homelessness.

Between 2020 and 2023, the patient was the subject of more than 140 EMS calls. He had been transported to multiple hospitals in the region, a sobering center, and psychiatric urgent care center – even being admitted on psychiatric holds on multiple occasions.

The Advanced Provider Response Unit (APRU) gave their all, going above and beyond to provide caring service to this patient. APRU personnel began to visit the patient, almost daily, to try to prevent 9-1-1 calls.

In mid-2023, the patient happened to be at the same hospital when one of the APRU nurse practitioners saw him on their tracking board and was able to secure a social worker visit. The patient accepted help and was admitted to an impatient sober living facility.

The patient, now sober for more than 22 months, is housed, working, and reconnecting with their family. We learned of the patient's successful outcome when he reached out to the APRU team to share how well he was doing and to express his heartfelt gratitude for the exemplary care and support he received.

For demonstrating exemplary skill, commitment, and providing the gold standard of care to save a patient's life, the Fire Department is pleased to present an Emergency Medical Services Award to Dr. Saman Kashani, Nurse Practitioner Orue Aristides, Nurse Practitioner Thaddeus Rice, Nurse Practitioner Paul Triamarit, and Fire Fighter Aaron Cass.













STROKE PATIENT SAVE

Fire Fighter Alexis Miller

Fire Fighter Stewart Embrey

Fire Fighters (FFs) Alexis Miller and **Stewart** Embrey, assigned to Fire Station 101, responded to a call of a patient suffering a syncopal episode on November 26, 2024.

Upon arrival and assessment, FFs Miller and Embrey determined the patient presented with syncope and left lower extremity neurological deficits. FFs Miller and Embrey quickly activated him as a Level One stroke patient. They also concluded the stroke was affecting carotid arteries.

The patient had likely experienced a small bleed associated with a syncopal episode (fall) and a heart attack stemming from a severe aortic dissection, both requiring immediate medical attention. FFs Miller and Embrey immediately provided advanced life support measures and transported the patient to a local area hospital where he underwent 12 hours of surgery.

About a week later, the patient was discharged home in good neurological health.

For an exceptional lifesaving medical response and quick thinking that led to a lifesaving rescue, the Fire Department is proud to present an Emergency Medical Services Award to Fire Fighter Alexis Miller and Fire Fighter Stewart Embrey.

On July 28, 2024, Engine 167 was dispatched to a two-story structure fire with multiple, trapped patients in the City of El Monte.

Engine 167 was first to arrive on scene. Fire Captain (Captain) Brian Underwood, incident commander, conducted a scene size-up and immediately requested a second alarm resource assignment. Crew members from Engine 168 joined Engine 167 firefighters to initiate search and rescue efforts and assist with firefighting operations.

In a coordinated effort between personnel assigned to Engines 167 and 168, the unresponsive patient was located in the apartment's back bedroom between a dresser and the bed. Firefighters had to quickly and safely rescue the patient while navigating heavy smoke and extinguishing the fire in the living room to make it out safely.


Outside on the front lawn awaited firefighters assigned to Paramedic Squad 90. Firefighters immediately initiated advanced life support measures before transporting the patient to a local area hospital in critical, but stable condition.

PSYCHOLOGICAL CRISIS RESCUE

Fire Fighter Solomon Beoranje

A frantic emergency call was made to the 9-1-1 Communications Center reporting an adult on the edge of the 710 Freeway over the Los Angeles River in the City of South Gate. Quint 147 quickly arrived on scene to find a male patient sitting on the overpass with an approximate 50-foot drop. Traffic was halted in both directions as first responders worked to secure the area.

Fire Fighter (FF) Mathew Smith was able to establish a rapport with the patient by listening without judgment, which helped to calm the patient. Meanwhile, FF Solomon Beoranje created a boundary to ensure no one interfered with the patient's progress.

As time progressed, the patient became overstimulated and anxious due to the increased first-responder presence. Fearing the patient would jump, FF Beoranje quickly hugged the patient from behind as FF Smith secured his legs, successfully removing the individual from the overpass ledge to safety.

FFs evaluated the patient and transported them to a local area hospital for further evaluation and care.

For displaying extraordinary courage, swift action, empathy, and teamwork in the face of danger, the Fire Department is proud to present a Unit Citation to Fire Fighter Solomon Beoranje and Fire Fighter Mathew Smith.

VINTON INCIDENT

Fire Fighter Arby Fields

In the mid-afternoon of August 25, 2024, a structure fire broke out on Vinton Avenue in the City of Pomona, prompting a swift response from Fire Station 182.

The initial scene size-up indicated a one-story, abandoned church with heavy smoke coming from the roof. Shortly after, Engine 184 arrived on scene. As heavy smoke and fire surrounded the building, Fire Fighter (FF) Arby Fields used forcible entry to quickly access the structure with limited visibility.

Once entry was made, he used a thermal imaging camera to scan the inside of the structure where he found an unconscious adult. FF Fields worked with FF Kieran Headington quickly to safely extricate the patient from the smoke and fire-filled structure.

Squad 183 personnel provided immediate advanced life support measures to the patient suffering from shallow respirations and burns. The patient was transported to a local hospital for further evaluation and treatment.

A brush fire erupted in Newhall on July 6, 2024. Engine 73 was first to arrive on scene with Engines 150 and 111 arriving shortly after. The fire was intense with 30- to 40-foot flames burning on a steep hillside at a rapid rate of spread and threatening nearby structures. Engine 111's Fire Captain (Captain) Arthur Monroe, the incident structure defense group leader, quickly sprang into action as a large apartment was impeded by the fire.

As the fire threatened two sides of the apartment, Fire Fighters (FF) Billy Hobbs, Josh May, Joe Thomas, Bryan Carreon, and Ashlee Desire, employed hand lines to extinguish the flames. FF May saw smoke coming from the eaves of the apartment corner and quickly notified his chain of command, Captain David Haws. As he began investigating the source of the smoke, a Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department Deputy notified Captain Haws that two people and two pets were trapped in a second-floor apartment unit.

With the front door inaccessible, the deck starting to get consumed by fire, and the fire growing in the living room, Captains Haws and Monroe quickly made access through the broken sliding-glass door on the deck. As smoke, fire, and heat were filling the apartment, the captains quickly found the individuals and their dogs taking cover in a bedroom. Captain Haws assisted one patient from the building as Captain Monroe helped the other along with two pets. Meanwhile, FFs Hobbs, Carreon, and Desire stayed on the hoselines, clearing a cool path for everyone to exit safely. Once the patients were in the safety zone, FFs May and Thomas treated the patients before transporting them to a local area hospital for further evaluation and treatment.

SLAUSON INCIDENT

Fire Fighter Troy Litchfield

On March 26, 2024, Urban Search and Rescue (USAR) Task Force 103 responded to assist a patient on a billboard suffering from a possible psychological crisis. Upon arrival, Fire Fighter (FF) Troy Litchfield climbed approximately 80 feet up a ladder to gain access to a billboard located next to a hotel where an elderly patient was threatening to attempt suicide.

As FF Litchfield climbed toward the elderly patient, he utilized his technical USAR skills to safely gain access to the billboard without aggravating the patient. FF Litchfield showed great skill and care, calmly communicating with the patient over the course of several hours. At one point, as the patient started to walk away threatening to jump off the billboard, FF Litchfield reacted courageously, swiftly, and decisively by quickly running to grab and save the patient from falling.

Once the patient was secured, FF Litchfield safely brought the patient to the ground. FFs evaluated the patient and transported them to a local area hospital for further evaluation and care.

For displaying courage and bravery in going above and beyond the call of duty by risking his life to save another in conditions that put him at extreme personal risk, the Fire Department is pleased to present a Certificate of Valor to Fire Fighter Troy Litchfield.

On January 25, 2024, at 10:10 a.m., while responding to an emergency medical services call in Fire Station 114's area, Paramedic Squad 93 was involved in a three-vehicle traffic collision that resulted in entrapment. Paramedic Squad 93 was traveling east on Palmdale Boulevard with its lights and sirens activated. As the paramedic squad approached oncoming traffic, a sedan traveling west on Palmdale Boulevard began to yield by gradually slowing down. However, a full-size pick-up truck also traveling westbound crossed over the centerline of the two-lane highway, resulting in a head-on collision with Paramedic Squad 93.

Fire Fighter (FF) Dustin Roberto immediately attempted to notify the Los Angeles Communication Center (LACC) of the incident. Due to the condition of the paramedic squad, he was only able to access the VHF radio microphone and transmit the request for assistance. Given the channel is an unrepeated channel, the transmission was not heard by the LACC; however, a captain from Engine 93 heard the radio traffic from Paramedic Squad 93 and notified the LACC of the incident, initiating a response.

The driver of the sedan and FF Roberto, who was in the passenger side of Paramedic Squad 93, managed to self-extricate from their vehicles despite their injuries. Due to the severity of the impact, the drivers of Paramedic Squad 93 and the full-size truck were trapped and would require extrication.

Within a few short minutes, FF Roberto developed a rescue plan to free his fellow FF who remained trapped with severe injuries. As FF Roberto executed extrication of and freed the trapped FF, Engine 93, along with Squad 131, Patrol 92, and Air Operations arrived on the scene and assisted in the extrication of the second patient in the pick-up truck. Both patients were assessed and treated on scene and transported to a trauma hospital for further evaluation and treatment.

For displaying extra ordinary courage, skill, and bravery in going above and beyond the call of duty to rescue a trapped firefighter, the Fire Department is pleased to present the posthumous Medal of Valor to the wife of fallen Fire Fighter Dustin Roberto.



SCOTT INCIDENT

On July 25, 2024, firefighters were dispatched to a residential structure fire with a report of residents trapped in the City of Whittier.

Upon arrival, firefighters reported a one-story single-family home with heavy smoke and fire from the "Charlie" side. Four occupants had escaped to safety, but family frantically reported to firefighters one additional family member was trapped inside the front bedroom of the home. The family member, who is blind, was unable to self-evacuate.

The fire captain assigned to Quint 15 quickly grabbed and confirmed the trapped family member over the command channel, and prioritized life by directing the crew to locate and extricate them. Engine 59 firefighters assigned to the search attempted to bring a 13/4" hose line to the front door. However, extreme fire conditions forced Engine 59 and Quint 15 firefighters to retreat. Despite wearing their full complement of personal protective equipment, Quint 15 firefighters sustained burns to their ears due to the intense heat.

A firefighter specialist assigned to Quint 15 quickly grabbed and utilized a rotary saw to remove the security bars from the front bedroom window, where the family member was reported to be trapped. Despite the unknown dangers, a window-initiated search was then quickly and safely performed by Fire Fighters (FFs) Cody Starbird and Jacob Merrill.

Upon entering the room through the bedroom window, FFs Starbird and Merrill were confronted with heavy smoke banked to the floor. With near-zero visibility, FFs Starbird and Merrill slowly made their way through the room by floor and were able to locate the trapped family member. FFs Starbird and Merrill quickly and safely extricated the family member who was found unconscious and experiencing severe respiratory distress from smoke inhalation.

FFs assigned to Paramedic Squad 49 promptly provided basic and advanced life support measures, quickly transporting the patient to a local area hospital for further evaluation and treatment. Within the hour, the patient regained consciousness.

The quick thinking and window-initiated search and removal was critical to the blind family member's survival.

For displaying extraordinary courage, skill, and teamwork in the face of danger and risking their own safety to save the life of another, the Department is pleased to present a Medal of Valor to Fire Fighter Jacob Merrill and Fire Fighter Cody Starbird.
